INVERCLYDE AMATEUR SWIMMING CLUB

Determined young swimmers from the Inverciyde Amateur Swimming Club are embarking on an ambitious fundraising effort to upgrade their pool. Their goal is to install six new racing blocks at the Waterfront Leisure Centre's pool in Greenock. With a target of £12,000, they aim to cover half the distance from Greenock to Paris, symbolising the journey of aquatic athletes.



IADE McDONALD

Fourteen-year-old Jade displayed remarkable bravery during a devastating fire on Wren Road in Greenock. Alerted by the fire alarm while delivering food to her neighbours, Jade, along with her mother Linda, rescued a woman and her daughter from the blazing property. Her quick thinking and courage in the face of danger saved lives, earning her praise and admiration from her community.



SKYF McCABF

From the age of six, Skye has been a beacon of generosity, ensuring deprived children in Inverclyde receive gifts at Christmas. Now 14, she has raised substantial funds through various initiatives like selling reindeer food and hot chocolate cones, along with bake sales and raffles. Skye's annual efforts ensure all young people in the district experience the joy of Christmas.

ABBIE MARSHALL

Abbie, a resilient young girl from Gourock, defied the odds after surviving a severe bout of meningitis as a baby. Despite facing challenges such as delayed speech and sensory issues, she thrives today. In a remarkable act of resilience, Abbie completed a charity walking challenge for Meningitis Now, raising £2,250 to support others affected by the disease.



ALYSSA McLELLAN

Alyssa, a spirited seven-year-old from Greenock, made a splash for a cause close to her heart by sitting in a paddling pool filled with Heinz beans. Her creative fundraiser, inspired by her love for baked beans, raised awareness and funds for Young Lives vs Cancer, earning praise for her ingenuity and compassion.



HARRIET McCONWAY

Seven-year-old Harriet showed remarkable bravery when her mother experienced a diabetic episode, becoming unresponsive. Despite her fear, Harriet took charge, caring for her mum, making crucial phone calls, and tending to her younger siblings, aged two and three, until help arrived.



NAOMI RANKIN

Kind-hearted five-year-old Naomi from Greenock used her crafting skills to raise funds for vulnerable individuals. Spending hours creating Christmas tree decorations, she sold her creations at local fetes, raising £500 for homeless and impoverished individuals. Naomi's compassionate nature shines through as she continues to make a difference in her community.



HEALTH & CARE CHAMPION OF THE YEAR



ANDREW NISBET

Andrew Nisbet, 62, from Greenock, has saved countless newborns through his blood and platelet donations since the early 1990s. Honoured by the Scottish National Blood Transfusion Service, he recently learned that parents of the babies he helped save want to thank him personally for his lifesaving contributions.



DANCE FOR PARKINSON'S

The Dance for Parkinson's class at the Beacon Arts Centre, a joint initiative with Scottish Ballet and Dance Base charity, provides regular exercise and social interaction for those with Parkinson's. These sessions enhance confidence, balance. and coordination, and include social time with tea and cake, tackling isolation and loneliness.



INVERCLYDE ROYAL HOSPITAL STAFF

The exceptional care from Inverclyde Royal Hospital staff, including clinical nurse specialist Lesley Ann Glancy and consultant Dr. Sylvia Brown, inspired former patient Betty Murray to raise over £8,000. Their calm and caring approach during challenging health issues led Dumbarton based Betty to remain in Inverclyde for treatment and give back to the unit with her fundraising efforts.

MAN ON! INVERCLYDE

Since 2020, Man On! Inverclyde has supported over 700 people, preventing numerous suicides. Through dedicated trustees, staff, and volunteers, they have expanded their services. Their community hub thrives, offering crucial support and hope to members who credit the charity with saving their lives.



SKYLARK CENTRE -INVERCIYDE ROYAL HOSPITAL

The Skylark Centre at Inverclyde Royal Hospital, transformed by Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity, now offers a bright, welcoming space for 800 young patients annually. The £36,000 refurbishment includes vibrant murals, new furniture, and a TV, plus £9,500 worth of sensory equipment, enhancing care for various paediatric conditions.



YOUR VOICE INVERCLYDE

Your Voice, driven by individuals with health and caregiving experiences, enhances Inverclyde's community wellbeing. Addressing challenges like Long Covid, they've created one of the first support groups. Recently praised by a Member of the Scottish Parliament, their work proves crucial in building resilience and improving health outcomes.



SENIOR COMMUNITY CHAMPION OF THE YEAR



EDDIE McCLUSKEY MBF

Eddie McCluskey MBE, an inspirational swimming coach, has dedicated over four decades to empowering young people with disabilities through the Port Glasgow Otters. Despite not considering himself a proficient swimmer. Eddie's coaching prowess has led four athletes to Paralympic gold medals, including Margaret McEleny MBE and Kenny Cairns MBE. As president and mentor for 40 years, Eddie's passion for coaching has transformed lives and left a lasting impact on the Port Otters community.



IIM HFARI

Lieutenant Commander Jim Hearl, a cornerstone of the Greenock and District Sea Cadets Corps, has devoted over 50 years to shaping the lives of young people in Invercivde. Jim's leadership has earned T.S. Tidesurge national recognition as one of the top sea cadet corps. Despite challenges, including the allure of street gangs in his youth, Jim found his calling in the sea cadets, where his passion for sailing and nurturing voung talent continues to thrive. With 42 current members, lim's legacy of leadership and mentorship endures, ensuring future generations benefit from his guidance.



SADIE MARTIN

Sadie Martin, one of Ardgowan Hospice's most dedicated volunteers, has selflessly served the charity for 35 years, despite battling health issues. Despite her own struggles, the 71-year-old community stalwart remains committed to grassroots causes, contributing to initiatives like the Tail o' the Bank Credit Union and the award-winning Belville Community Garden. Sadie's unwavering dedication reflects her deep-rooted connection to her community, where she has lived for over half a century.

Led by environmental officer Don Thomas, this project invites families and nurseries to explore nature, fostering creativity and learning through engaging activities in Greenock's great outdoors.



GLOW BAMBINO

Jade Gilbride's Glow Bambino provides an inclusive, interactive baby group for new parents and grandparents in Gourock and Kilmacolm. Despite her own health challenges, Jade's dedication has kept the award-winning classes running, creating a beloved community resource that continues to grow and thrive.



JOHN LAIRD

Greenock-born entrepreneur John Laird, with his wife Michelle, has donated £150,000 to causes like Children in Poverty Inverclyde. His £3,500 gift provided summer holidays for local children. Raised in Bow Road, John remains dedicated to giving back to the community that shaped him.



PLATINUM PAVING

Platinum Paving has thrived post-COVID, evolving from a local business to a commercial contractor for major brands like Starbucks and Burger King. HOME FOR JOY

Home For Joy, part of the Hit The Road initiative's tenth season, headlined at the Beacon Arts Centre in March. This project offers young people aged 14-19 the opportunity to tour their music, gain industry experience, and connect with new audiences. Joining Low Tide and Adam and the Observers on tour, Home For Joy brought their Radiohead and Muse-inspired music to great success.



MARIA McMASTER

Despite losing her father as a baby, Maria McMaster, a singing sensation from St Columba's High in Gourock, is pursuing her dream of opera stardom. Featured in an American rapper's video viewed 24 million times, Maria secured a coveted place at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. Selected to appear alongside Post Malone in his Loch Lomond video shoot. Maria continues to soar towards her musical aspirations, defying all odds.



RIVERSIDE YOUTH BAND

The Riverside Youth Band has achieved remarkable success recently, with both its youth and training bands crowned Scottish champions on the same day. The youth band's historic entry into the senior section earned them qualification for the 2025 European Youth Championships. Representing Inverclyde with pride, they continue to excel on stages near and far.
